INTRODUCTION

"What, if anything, can a poet be said to owe other people in general, considered as a community? For what is the poet answerable?"

With these words, the poet and critic **Robert Pinsky**, whose keynote address will kick off this year's DLR Poetry Now Festival, hones in on questions which are today at the very core of our encounter with poetry; questions of engagement, of honesty, of responsibility. In difficult times, how does poetry make a difference? In times of any kind, what are the things that poetry can do?

Thankfully, we have no simple answers to questions like these. Instead, we have the pleasure and the provocation of watching, and listening, as they come to life, in the words and the worlds of a wealth of Irish and international poets. We hope you will join us in celebrating the best of contemporary poetry, in all its vision and its brilliance, at this year's events.

We are thrilled to have **Robert Pinsky**, the former US Poet Laureate, give our keynote address this year. We're thrilled, too, to welcome his fellow American poet **Frank Bidart**, who will read with the remarkable **Tomaž Šalamun**, from Slovenia, and the equally remarkable Irish poet **Eiléan Ní Chuilleanáin**.

It's a real pleasure, meanwhile, to welcome back another powerful Irish poet, Harry Clifton, whose collection Secular Eden (Wake Forest University Press) last year won The Irish Times Poetry Now Award. He will read with Tomas Venclova, whose voice is one of the most unique and important



in European poetry today. Younger poets, as ever, will play a vital part in the weekend; from Belarus, Valzhyna Mort, from the UK, Adam Foulds and Paul Batchelor, and from Northern Ireland, Colette Bryce. We're delighted to welcome, also, the Indian poet Sujata Bhatt, the Scottish poet Carol Ann Duffy (who will lead a children's event as well as giving a reading for the rest of us), Ellen Hinsey from the US, Ian Duhig from the UK and our own Paddy Bushe.

In a very special event, this year's festival will honour our great friend, **Seamus Heaney**, with a reading to mark his 70th birthday. Come and hear the poets of DLR Poetry Now 2009 read poems for our Nobel Laureate on this great occasion.

The festival will also host writing workshops, the children's reading, a debate on the competing worlds of Irish poetry, and the announcement and presentation of **The Irish Times Poetry Now Award 2009** for best collection of poetry in 2008 and the **Rupert & Eithne Strong Award** for best first collection in 2008. We hope to have your company at the readings, talks and events.

The Irish Times Poetry Now Award 2009 is the only award of its kind which rewards work by Irish poets. It recognises the best collection of poems published by an Irish poet in 2008 and has previously been awarded to Harry Clifton, Seamus Heaney, Derek Mahon and Dorothy Molloy.

Robert Pinsky

The Fate of the Modern

From 1997 to 2000, Robert Pinksy served an unprecedented three terms



as Poet Laureate of the United States. During that time, he transformed the relationship of the American reading public to poetry, establishing the hugely successful Favorite Poem Project. Pinsky is a prolific critic and essayist as well as a Pulitzer-nominated poet and translator, and to date he has published seven volumes of poetry (most recently *Gulf Music*, FSG, 2008), a best-selling translation of *Dante's Inferno* (FSG, 1997) and several books about poetry. He teaches at Boston University, is poetry editor for the online magazine *Slate*, and writes the weekly *Poet's Choice* column for the *Washington Post*. He is also one of the very few members of the American Academy of Arts and Letters to have appeared on *The Simpsons*.

Tonight, Pinsky will talk about how what he calls the "mighty tide" of modernism sets an example of poetic commitment and engagement to meet the challenges from a cynical age. Though poetry is vulnerable to a worrying deprecation from a number of directions, Pinsky argues, modernism can truly penetrate the political and cultural territories of today, and this he will show in his keynote address, with his characteristic reach, energy and originality.

Sujata Bhatt

Sujata Bhatt was born in Ahmedabad, India, in 1956, and grew up in India and in the United States. She has published seven books of poetry, most recently *Pure Lizard* (Carcanet, 2008), which was shortlisted for the Forward Prize. Her poetry has



won several awards, including the Commonwealth Poetry Prize (Asia) and the Cholmondeley Award, and has been widely anthologised and broadcast on radio and TV. Her translations of Gujarati poems featured in the *Penguin Anthology of Contemporary Indian Women's Poetry* (1993), and she has also translated poems from German into English. She has been a Lansdowne Visiting Writer at the University of Victoria, a Visiting Fellow at Dickinson College in Pennsylvania, and Poet-in-Residence at the Poetry Archive in London. She lives in Bremen, Germany.

Paddy Bushe

Paddy Bushe was born in Dublin in 1948, and has lived in Co. Kerry since the early 1970s. He has published eleven books of poetry in English and Irish. He received the Oireachtas prize for poetry and the Michael Hartnett Poetry Award, both



in 2006, and has also won the Strokestown International Poetry Prize. *To Ring in Silence*, a collection of new and selected earlier poems, includes his translations of classic Irish lyrics and was published by the Dedalus Press in 2008. He is a member of Aosdána.

Paul Batchelor

Paul Batchelor was born in Northumberland in 1977. Before publishing his debut collection, *The Sinking Road* (Bloodaxe) in 2008, he had already won the Eric Gregory Award, the Andrew Waterhouse Award and the Poetry Business Prize. *The Sinking Road* was shortlisted



for the Jerwood Aldeburgh Prize and a Glen Dimplex Award. He teaches Creative Writing at Newcastle University.

Harry Clifton

Harry Clifton was born in Dublin in 1952 and has published six collections of poems, including The Desert Route: Selected Poems 1973-1988 (1992) and Night Train Through the Brenner (1994), both from Gallery Books. His most recent collection,



Secular Eden: Paris Notebooks 1994-2004 (Wake Forest University Press), won the 2008 Irish Times Poetry Now Award. He teaches at the School of English, University College Dublin.

Tomas Venclova

Tomas Venclova was born in Lithuania in 1937. As a young poet, he met and translated Anna Akhmatova and Boris Pasternak, and was involved with Joseph Brodsky and others in the Lithuanian and Soviet dissident movements. Exiled in 1977, he has



taught Slavic languages and literature at Yale University since 1985. He has written many books of poetry and scholarship, and his work has been translated into more than 20 languages. His many awards include the Vilenica Prize, the Lithuanian National Prize, and the Prize of Two Nations, which he received jointly with Czeslaw Milosz in 2002. His most recent book in English is *The Junction* (Bloodaxe, 2008), from which he will read tonight with his translator, Ellen Hinsey.

Valzhyna Mort

Valzyhna Mort was born in 1981 in Minsk, Belarus. Her debut collection, Ja tonen'kaja jak tvae vejki (I'm as Thin as Your Eyelashes) was published in Belarus in 2005. In the same year, she moved to the United States, and in 2008 she made her American



debut with the collection Factory of Tears (Copper Canyon Press). For the anthology New European Poets (Graywolf Press, 2008), she translated into English the work of a number of Eastern European poets. Her awards include the 2005 Velenica Prize (for reading performance) and the Gaude Polonia Award. She currently lives in Washington, DC.

Ellen Hinsey

Ellen Hinsey was born in Boston in 1960 and has lived in France for the last two decades. She is the author of three books of poetry: *Update on the Descent* (Bloodaxe, 2009), a 2007 National Poetry Series Finalist, *The White Fire of Time* (Wesleyan, 2002/



Bloodaxe, 2003) and *Cities of Memory* (Yale, 1996), winner of the Yale Series of Younger Poets Award. She has also edited and co-translated Tomas Venclova's *The Junction* (Bloodaxe, 2008). Her other honours include a Rona Jaffe Foundation Award, a Berlin Prize Fellowship and a Lannan Foundation Award.

lan Duhig was born to Irish parents in London in 1954. He has published five poetry collections and has been shortlisted for the Whitbread, the Forward, the TS Eliot and the Costa Awards. His most recent collection is *The Speed*



of Dark (Picador, 2007). He has twice won the National Poetry Competition. He worked for 15 years with homeless people, and has held fellowships at Lancaster, Leeds, Durham and Newcastle Universities, as well as being the 2003 International Writer Fellow at Trinity College, Dublin.

Eiléan Ní Chuilleanáin

Eiléan Ní Chuilleanáin was born in Cork in 1942 and has published seven collections of poetry, most recently *The Girl Who Married the Reindeer* (Gallery Books, 2001). Last year saw the publication of



her Selected Poems (Gallery Books and Faber). She was a founding editor of the literary journal Cyphers and has won many awards for her poetry, including the Patrick Kavanagh Award and the O'Shaughnessy Award of the Irish-American Cultural Institute. She is a Fellow and Professor of English at Trinity College, Dublin, and a member of Aosdána.

Tomaž Šalamun

Tomaž Šalamun, born in 1941, has published more than 30 books of poetry in his home country of Slovenia. 11 of his collections have been published in English, most recently *There's the Hand and There's the Arid*



Chair (Counterpath Press, 2009) and Woods and Chalices (Harcourt, 2008). His honours include the Prešeren Fund Prize, the Jenko Prize, a Pushcart Prize, a visiting Fulbright to Columbia University, and a fellowship to the International Writing Programme at the University of Iowa. In 1996, he was appointed the Slovenian Cultural Attache in New York. He lives in Ljubljana, Slovenia.

Frank Bidart was born in California in 1939, and studied at Harvard with Robert Lowell and Elizabeth Bishop. He has published six books of poetry. His fifth volume, *Desire* (FSG, 1997) was nominated for








Ciaran Berry The Sphere of Birds (Gallery Books)

Ciaran Berry was born in Dublin in 1971 and grew up in Carna, County Galway and Falcarragh, County Donegal. He was a New York Times Fellow at NYU, where he received

an MFA and now teaches on the Writing Programme. His poems have been widely published in American and Irish journals and selected for Best New Poets 2006 and Best American Poetry 2008. *The Sphere of Birds*, his first collection, won the Jerwood Aldeburgh First Collection Prize.






Patrick Cotter Perplexed Skin (Arlen House)

Patrick Cotter was born in Cork in 1963 where he continues to live and work as director of the Munster Literature Centre. He has published poems in numerous periodicals,

anthologies and chapbooks including A Misogynist's Blue Nightmare (Raven Arts Press) and The True Story of Aoife and Lir's Children (Three Spires Press). He has translated poetry from German and Estonian, and his translations of the Surrealist poet Andres Ethin were collected in Moosebeetle Swallow (Southword Editions). His work has been shortlisted for both the Hennessy Award and the Patrick Kavanagh Award.

Áine Moynihan Canals of Memory (Doghouse)

A native of Co. Wexford, Áine Moynihan trained as a professional actor in the Abbey Theatre in the 1970s and also graduated in Arts and Education

from UCD. She lived for almost a decade on the islands of Inishere and Cape Clear and moved to Dún Chaoin in the late 1980s. She graduated in psychotherapy from UCC in the 1990s, later working in the areas of personal development and psychotherapy. In 2002 she founded the Youth Theatre Company, AnnÓg. She now divides her time between writing and directing.

Adam Foulds

Adam Foulds was born in London in 1975. His debut book of poetry, *The Broken Word* (Cape), a poetic sequence set at the time of the Mau Mau uprising in Kenya, was published in 2008, and won the Costa



Prize for Poetry. Foulds was also named The Sunday Times Young Writer of the Year 2008. As well as poetry, he writes fiction and has published two novels: *The Truth About These Strange Times* (Orion, 2007), and *The Quickening Maze* (Cape, 2009).

Colette Bryce

Colette Bryce was born in Derry in 1970. She has published three collections of poetry: The Heel of Bernadette (2000), The Full Indian Rope Trick (2004) and Self-Portrait in the Dark (2008), all from Picador. She



has also published a pocket book, *The Observations of Aleksandr Svetlov* (Donut Press 2007). At the 2001 DLR Poetry Now Festival, she won the inaugural Rupert & Eithne Strong Award, and she has also won the Aldeburgh Prize and the National Poetry Competition.

Broken News: The Poem and the World

Thursday 26th March 1pm FREE EVENT

A poem is its own reality. But reality intrudes, too, on the realm of the poem; the poem, sometimes, makes itself news, reaches out far beyond the subjective moment to the social context, to the headline, to the event. What are the ways in which poetry



grapples with what happens? How do contemporary poets balance a responsibility to society with a responsibility to language and to the poem; how do they balance the desire to bear witness to the world with the desire to attend only to the world of the poem?

In advance of the 2009 festival, the curator of DLR Poetry Now will give a talk on the tension between these twin responsibilities, these dual desires. The talk will include a discussion of poems by several of the poets from this year's programme.

Children's Reading

Friday 27th March 10:00am

Two acclaimed Scottish artists - the poet Carol Ann Duffy and the musician John Sampson - will present a special performance of poetry and music for the children involved in the Dún Laoghaire - Rathdown Poetry Now Education Programme. The programme is designed to introduce 8-10 year olds to contemporary poetry and involves a teachers' workshop and a number of preand post-festival school visits.

Carol Ann Duffy is one of the best-loved and wittiest of contemporary poets. Her books for children include the poetry collections *Meeting Midnight* (1999), *The Good Child's Guide to Rock n Roll* (2003) and *The Hat* (2007), all from Faber, and *The Princess Blankets* (Templar, 2008), as well as several picture books. She is also an acclaimed playwright.

John Sampson is a musician who has performed with Carol Ann Duffy for six years at literary festivals around England and Scotland. He plays many instruments, among them the crumhorn, the shepherd's pipe, the gemshorn, the recorder and the trumpet, and he looks forward to bringing them all to his young Irish audience.


